

## Wright State University Boonshoft School of Medicine Sponsored Graduate Medical Education Annual Institutional Report 2015

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Our 23 sponsored programs have provided graduate medical education to 372 residents (see attachment). Affiliated programs in Internal Medicine, Transitional Year, and Cardiovascular Disease sponsored by Kettering Medical Center educated 47 trainees; the United States Air Force School of Aerospace Medicine delivered graduate training to 20 residents in Preventive Medicine and Aerospace Medicine.

## **Institutional Accreditation**

The Boonshoft School of Medicine was reviewed for accreditation in 2009 and received a full five year cycle of accreditation. Three minor citations were noted and corrected soon after the letter of notification. Subsequently, as part of the NAS, BSoM was given an extended length of full accreditation to 2024.

## ACGME Next Accreditation System (NAS) and Clinical Learning Environment Reviews (CLER)

In 2012, the ACGME launched the Next Accreditation System (NAS) for programs and institutions. This sweeping change expands the competency-based model of accreditation into a more defined outcomes based approach. The GMEC and GME Office have undertaken significant efforts and resources to support our programs and BSOM in preparing for the new requirements.

The revised Institutional Requirements have focused on the CLER (Clinical Learning Environment Review) program that focuses on institutional and hospital training experiences. The CLER reviews are conducted in clinical settings and closely resemble Joint Commission visits. Six areas are monitored: patient safety, quality improvement, supervision, duty hours, fatigue recognition and mitigation, and professionalism.

The first BSOM institutional CLER site visit, was conducted in November 2014 at Miami Valley Hospital. This initial activity was conducted over a 2 day period with Dr. Dale Ray as the lead reviewer. The overall experience was very productive in examining our performance in the six core areas. We received a full report in 2015 and an Executive Summary is attached. We will continue to focus on the findings especially with regard to education of our trainees and tracking PSQI metrics. We anticipate our next site visit to occur in 2016.

## ACGME Faculty Survey

The ACGME Faculty Survey of all core program faculty for residency and fellowships was generally very positive. Overall, of the 23 questions, the majority of programs exceeded the national average. Of programs with 7+ residents, the number of questions 10% below the national average were: Pediatrics (2), Psychiatry (2) OB/GYN (2) Orthopedic Surgery (1) and Surgery (4). Programs with 6 or less trainees, the number of questions reporting 10% below the national aggregate were: Sports Medicine (2), Cardiology (4), GI (3), ID (1), Neurology (4), Plastics Surgery (1) and Child and Adolescent Psychiatry (1). Programs will continue to monitor faculty satisfaction through this survey and address concerns accordingly.

## **ACGME Resident Survey**

ACGME provided results of the Annual Resident Survey on 14 of the 19 ACGME accredited programs. Programs with fewer than 6 trainees were not reported and two additional fellowships (Orthopedic Trauma and Acute Care Surgery) are non-ACGME accredited.

Programs of 7+ residents with more than 5/41 questions that were more than 10 percent below the national average:

Psychiatry (11) Surgery (14) Programs with 7+ residents with no questions below the national average: Emergency Medicine Family Medicine OB/GYN Orthopedic Surgery

All programs have received this data and have undertaken initiatives to improve on elements that are below the national average and also increase other aspects of program performance.

## Summary

All Boonshoft School of Medicine residency and fellowship programs are fully accredited. Program director turnover is relatively low and collaboration among programs and trainees is very good. Board passage rates are above the national average for all programs and the number of trainees who are dismissed is very low on an annual basis. The DIO has been in this position for 8 years with almost 30 years of experience in GME including service at the hospital and city wide levels. BSOM partnerships among our six major training sites continues to be strong. Matches for resident positions continues to be excellent and our programs retain an estimated 25% of BSOM graduates on average. The NAS and CLER changes are ongoing opportunities for improvement and programs are fully engaged in these pursuits. BSOM will be diligent in the oversight of graduate medical education and endeavor to increase its integration with medical student and continuing medical education to further lifelong learning as a standard of excellent for all learners.
