Congratulations to the newest alumni of the Physician Leadership Development Program! These nine accomplished individuals received combined M.D./M.B.A. or M.D./M.P.H. degrees alongside 98 of their colleagues during the Boonshoft School of Medicine's 34th commencement and hooding ceremony on May 24.

The occasion featured the conferring of degrees as well as a traditional hooding ceremony and the signing of a professional oath. The commencement ceremony took place at the Benjamin and Marian Schuster Center and featured speaker Dr. Michelle Au, a noted author and medical blogger.

To graduates of the Physician Leadership Development Program, the ceremony represented the culmination of five years of rigorous coursework, intricate research projects, innovative leadership initiatives, and raw determination.

Three students received awards of recognition prior to the ceremony. Sarah Elswick, M.D., M.B.A., earned the Dan W. Elliott, M.D., Award for outstanding performance in her surgical clerkships and dedication to the field. The Reach Out of Montgomery County Student Volunteer Appreciation Award was presented to Colleen McCormick, M.D., M.P.H. Sarah and Colleen were both also recognized with the American Medical Women's Association Glasgow-Rubin Citation for Academic Achievement. Meaghan Ebetino, M.D., M.P.H., M.P.H., received the Geriatric Medicine Award.

Introducing the PLDP Advisory Board

The newly created Physician Leadership Development Program Advisory Board met for the first time in May 2013.

The 16 individuals serving on the Advisory Board represent medical school faculty, community physician and health system leaders, and faculty from the Raj Soin College of Business, as well as PLDP leadership, alumni, and current students. The structure and composition of the advisory board will allow the PLDP to strengthen professional relationships within the Dayton community, foster high-quality ideas for program development, and engage in formalized strategic planning.

PLDP Director Sabrina Neeley, Ph.D., M.P.H., felt that the time was right to bring together an advisory board to assist in strategic planning for the future of the program. "The program has changed significantly in the past year in response to changes at the medical school and university levels," she explained. "The leadership and guidance provided by our board members will benefit our students and the program."

Recent Graduates Establish Quality Improvement Group

When graduates Colleen McCormick, M.D., M.P.H., and Lakshman Swamy, M.D., M.B.A., saw an opportunity to bring patient safety initiatives to the medical school, they did not hesitate.

The two recent PLDP alumni are responsible for establishing a local chapter of the Institute for Healthcare Improvement Open School in 2011. The chapter, christened Boonshoft for Healthcare Improvement (BHI), supports students of all health professions in learning about health care quality and patient safety.

McCormick states that the impetus to establish BHI stemmed from a feeling that patient safety is a critical, but at most institutions, an under-taught facet of good medical care, citing a recent statistic from the Institute for Healthcare Improvement that up to 100,000 lives are at stake each year from system-level errors.

"It's great that we are learning how to treat sepsis, but what if we are the ones causing sepsis? What do we do then?" McCormick said.

A 2008 study of fourth-year medical students published in *Medical Education* found that 76 percent of participants had witnessed a medical error at some point in their medical education. For this reason, it is important for medical students to feel comfortable approaching potential patient safety concerns in the clinical setting. BHI helps to provide students with the skills to take action if they witness an error.

BHI also encourages medical students to participate in the IHI coursework and student training conferences, and provides the tools to facilitate student-initiated quality improvement projects in the Dayton community. The courses are also accessible free-of-charge to interested students, residents, and faculty physicians who are not members of BHI.

"We can learn to be better advocates for our patients," McCormick stated. "That is why BHI is so important to me."


Convocation

Alumni Q & A: Brian Merrill, M.D., M.B.A.



Dr. Brian Merrill graduated from the PLDP in 2011 with degrees in medicine and business administration. He currently works as a resident physician in the Wright State University Residency Training Program in Psychiatry.

Why did you decide to complete a M.D./M.B.A.?

"I had a genuine intellectual curiosity about finance, marketing, economics, et cetera. The M.B.A. degree provided a great deal of knowledge that I would not

have found elsewhere. Also, I became convinced very early in my clinical experiences that the inefficiencies and ineffectiveness of the health care system would best be addressed by physicians and other clinical practitioners. Physician leaders are in a unique position to understand the complexities that contribute to human disease and solve problems on a systems level, all the while having the patient's best interests at heart."

What, if any, special research, projects, or special committees have you been working on since graduation?

"My M.B.A. degree has afforded me two very unique opportunities. I was selected for the Association of American Medical Colleges' Organization of Resident Representatives. The ORR functions as the voice of resident physicians for input into the development of AAMC policy. This organization has provided a number of leadership opportunities related to academic medicine and professional development. Additionally, I am a part of Premier Health's Innovate Team for Psychiatric Services. This group has tackled issues like reorganizing the number of psychiatric beds in the system, revamping psychiatric consultation services, and establishing outpatient psychiatric services for a Federally Qualified Health Center."

What are your career plans for the future, near or distant?

"I am undecided about pursuing fellowship training in child and adolescent psychiatry, and will be using clinical experiences in the near future to make that decision. In the long run, I see myself sticking around Dayton with my wife, Molly, and daughter, Sally. Ideally my clinical duties would include a mix of inpatient and outpatient services with opportunities to continue delivering psychotherapy services and hopefully teaching. I am definitely interested in pursuing leadership positions, but not unless they involve a heavy dose of clinical medicine."

Just for fun, who is your favorite superhero?

"My favorite superheroes were athletes Michael Jordan and Ken Griffey Jr."
