About Dr. Swerdlow:

Dr. Steven H. Swerdlow serves as professor of pathology and director of the division of hematopathology at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine. After graduating from Harvard Medical School, he became a resident in pathology at Beth Israel Hospital, Boston. He pursued four years of fellowship training and research in hematopathology at Vanderbilt University and St. Bartholomew's Hospital in London, England. Dr. Swerdlow has authored more than 180 peer-reviewed publications, including 85 in the past 10 years. He is lead editor of the new World Health Organization's monograph, "Classification of Tumours of Haematopoietic and Lymphoid Tissues," published in 2017. His research focuses mainly on the molecular, histopathologic, biologic, and clinical features of lymphomas.
